Alex Antoniou's PhD focuses on the new criminal offence of possession of extreme pornographic images. Reconsidering Ethics, Activism, and the Political* (Ashgate 2013).

Ayisigi Hale Gonel is currently doing research for the Encyclopaedia of Istanbul, having graduated with distinction from Istanbul Bilgi University for a dissertation on gendered name-bashing in high schools. Upon graduation, Gonel was admitted to Lund University where she recently received an MS in Social Studies of Gender. Interested in queer epistemologies, interdisciplinary queer methods, everyday formations of pansexual identity and historical queer texts, Gonel is currently working on homoerotic poetry and the underclass fetish in Ottoman Istanbul.
